Music Ministry

Whilst we are still in transition from the pandemic, we would aim to reintroduce all the previous elements of the music liturgy - with the pace of reintroduction dictated by the comfort zone of the community.

- while we're still zooming, with sound/video equipment where it is, it's more convenient to still have the musicians in the organ loft - and to use the organ for everything - rather than the piano.

- Restart Mustard Seed stall after Mass on first Sunday of the month, make special effort in lead up to Christmas
- To make the most of the 'build back better' mood after lockdown – buy less but buy better, think about its impact
- Hold Mustard Seed 'parties' in people's homes in November/December
- To make a difference in the wider world by supporting Cafod/Pax Christi events and campaigns

Earth & Faith Group – we have members on this ecumenical and environmental group. They organised a local Lent House Groups for us "Thy Kingdom Come". As part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee they are asking us all to plant trees in Faringdon, and our parish is hoping to take part.

Music Ministry

With an autumn/winter covid spike a distinct possibility, and with restrictions possibly RE-introduced, we feel that the cautious approach to reintroducing full music to our services probably continues to be the most appropriate way forward.

Our commitments financially are uncertain. We are constantly uncertain of how we will meet our financial commitments for repairs. • Extinction rebellion are campaigning against the Catholic church for investing in fossil fuels. • Charitable Giving – we no longer are able to do this as a parish and fund our own church expenses. We have in the past, but the challenge is to find ways to support charities close to our hearts whilst still funding our own needs. • We should start fundraising for the church buildings. We have some reserves but these could quickly depleted. <p>We need to re-convene the Finance and Maintenance Committee.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have a reminder to the parish of Gift Aid, Covenants, particularly with new parishioners. Wider promotion of this would be useful to the parish, an easy way to contribute to the parish. This was successful when we went to Zoom Masses during the pandemic. • We need to start fundraising for the church buildings by organising events. • We have net assets of £150K approximately, so are better off than many parishes. We will need an alternative venue for Worship during these repairs. (We are blessed to have received a grant to cover part of these repairs, £30K. This is likely to 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Our church building is of historic importance, it was built in the 1840's and is a former Congregational Hall. It is a Grade II listed building with the Conservation area of Faringdon. • Our church organ is also of historical importance. • We should seek to make greater use of lettings with our church hall and it is suggested we slightly increase our hourly rental rate. These currently include a Pilates Group, Oxfordshire County Council Families Group, parties and wedding receptions.

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	<p>expire soon although an extension has been granted. It is hoped the structural engineer will pay a site visit in September/October. It is thought there are two possible causes of cracking 1) subsidence (insurance is likely to fund this repair), or 2) Roof spread (the parish would need to fund repairs.)
